2010 HIGHLIGHTS IN UGANDA

Taking Development to the Next Level: Performance Enhancement



Over 20 years of conflict in Northern Uganda has had devastating effects on the region's education system. Many schools had to leave their sites when communities fled from the rebel army. When they returned, sometimes a decade later, many of the schools came back to just piles of bricks. African Revival has been building classrooms, latrines, libraries and counseling rooms for over 5 years. Buildings, however, do not necessarily lead to a higher **quality of education**.

Schools such as **Cubu Primary**, who we have been working with for over 3 years, now have a good

infrastructure, facilities and resources. 2010 saw the introduction of a new phase of their development; performance enhancement and motivational activities were implemented.

Activities ranged from refresher teacher training, School Management Committee training, the setting up of community and teachers' savings and loans groups to pupil visits to secondary schools, the provision of teachers' bicycles and girls' health workshops.

Cubu Primary has now reached a whole new level of performance. When African Revival first started working with the school, they did not have the resources to partake in Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE). Now, they are amongst the **highest performing school** in their division, with an astounding 100% pass rate amongst 2010 candidates! Cubu is an example of how a rural school within a poor community does not have to accept defeat or give into struggle. Teachers, pupils, parents and community members have persevered and used AR's support in the best way possible.

Our performance enhancement projects are also going on in Bwobomanam and Juba Road Primary Schools. They are all showing success which we believe is made through working with a school on a long term basis.



SUDAN

Lives changed in just 12 weeks!

On the 24th September 2010, guests at the African Revival annual ball started something really amazing. We told you about **Christ Town Primary School in Maridi**. They had only one mud hut classroom between 1,000 pupils, and no decent sanitation.

We are thrilled to announce that thanks to your support Christ Town Primary School is now a fully functioning school, with 3 equipped classroom blocks and 3 blocks of modern latrines. Not only do the children now have a fantastic space to learn in, their health is also protected thanks to the sanitation we have been able to deliver.

Thanks to some very generous donors who pledged support at the African Revival Ball, all of this work was carried out in just 12 weeks!



ZAMBIA

Kinnertone Primary School is transformed and donors visit!



African Revival has been working with **Kinnertone Community School** in southern Zambia for the past 4 years. This school is situated 8 km from the District capital of Kalomo, and draws its pupils from a number of surrounding settlements, where families are mostly engaged in subsistence farming

When Kinnertone School was set-up in 1995, it was little more than a single open-sided classroom with a thatched roof and dirt floor. By 2008, the community had gathered enough money to start constructing a single-roomed brick classroom building, however funds ran out before it could be completed. In early 2009, African Revival funded the completion of that building and drilled a borehole close to the school, giving the children and teachers access to a permanent source of clean and safe water.

Last year saw yet more changes at Kinnertone, with AR able to provide more assistance - this time to extend the school building and make it into a double classroom block with an office. The work was completed in August 2010 and we furnished the new classrooms. Due to the number of pupils, classes must still operate on a

rotational basis – some in the morning, some in the afternoon – but the completion of these classrooms has made an enormous difference to the learning environment. Today, Kinnertone has around 130 pupils and 4 members of staff, catering for primary grades 1 to 6. Although the pupils' parents and local community struggle to support the school financially, they have proved their commitment to the school's development and have actively participated in any work that takes place there, usually by providing raw materials and/or unskilled labour.

In February of this year, Kinnertone School was visited by two of AR's long-standing donors, Ian and Robyn Clark, whose donations have helped to transform life at the school. They received a very warm welcome from the children and spent time talking to the teachers and parents about their hopes and aspirations for the future of Kinnertone School. Before leaving, the children performed a number of poems and readings and were delighted when the visitors handed over a bag of assorted sports equipment to the head teacher, Patricia Samende.

WHAT 2011 HAS IN STORE...

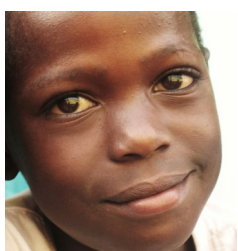


Our programmes in Uganda are ever expanding. With **new funding from the EU**, we are working in partnership with other charities in Northern Uganda to start up the 'Farmers
